Report for Decision: PCC 2019 / 005

Title: Police Property Act Fund donations 2018/19

Executive Summary:

The Police Property Act Fund is created from the proceeds of sale of goods recovered by the police that cannot be returned to their original owner. In accordance with the Police Property Act Regulations (1997) all awards from the fund must be for charitable purposes.

Applications were invited on 23rd November 2018 from local voluntary and community groups who are working to improve the lives of people in the Thames Valley Police area. The closing date for submitting applications was Monday 17th December at 9am.

Applicants had to demonstrate how their project or activity contributed to the following Police and Crime Plan priorities:

- Vulnerability
- Prevention and Early Intervention

In total 116 separate bids were received requesting funding of £0.811m.

All applications were considered in detail by an officer working group and, where relevant, additional information and/or support was obtained from local police areas or specialist departments.

Their recommendations were considered by the PCC and Chief Constable on 15th February 2019.

In total the PCC and Chief Constable have agreed to provide a grant to 32 separate organisations with funding of £100,700.

Recommendation:

The PCC is invited to APPROVE grants worth £100,700 to those local charities and community groups as set out in Appendix 1.

PART I - NOT CONFIDENTIAL

1 Introduction and background

- 1.1 The Police (Property) Act 1997 is a fund whereby allocations are received from the sale of recovered stolen goods or property. If the owners of the property are not traceable then the goods are sold at auction. The monies from the sales of the goods are then redistributed by way of grants or donations for charitable purposes that support and complement local policing and crime reduction priorities.
- 1.2 Approximately £275,000 is available for distribution during 2018/19, of which £75,000 has been given to the three county based High Sherriff's for them to allocate to local good causes who help the police reduce crime and disorder. The remaining £200,000 is available for allocation through two public bidding rounds.
- 1.3 Applicants had to demonstrate how their project or activity contributes to meeting the following Police & Crime Plan objectives:
 - Vulnerability
 - Prevention and Early Intervention
- 1.4 The bidding process commenced on 23rd November and closed at 9am on Monday 17th December 2018.
- 1.5 Under the Scheme of Governance, Financial Regulations provide for the PCC and Chief Constable to jointly determine the payments to be made in accordance with the Regulations.

2 Issues for consideration

- 2.1 Applicants were asked to explain how their work will help the PCC to deliver his police and Crime Plan objectives.
- 2.2 In total 116 separate bids for funding were received requesting total funding of £0.811m, which is over eight times higher than the amount currently available (approx. £0.1m) for distribution in this funding round. This therefore meant that the PCC and Chief Constable could only support a relatively small proportion of the total bids that had been received.
- 2.3 As such, all bids were reviewed and considered in detail to identify those that provide the greatest benefit to the PCC and Chief Constable in helping to deliver the Police and Crime Plan objectives. Where appropriate, additional views and comments were sought from Local Police Area commanders and/or specialist departments to ensure that the local policing context was also considered.
- 2.4 The PCC and Chief Constable have agreed to support 32 separate organisations with individual grants ranging from £1,000 to £6,000.

3 Financial comments

3.1 The PCC and Chief Constable have agreed to support 32 separate organisations with individual grants ranging from £1,000 to £6,000, as set out in Appendix 1. In total these grants amount to £100,700

4 Legal comments

4.1 Under regulation 6(4)(c) of the Police (Property) Regulations 1997 the payment must be made for "charitable purposes". By virtue of the Charities Act 2011 a charitable purposes is one that falls under section 3(1) of the Act and is for the public benefit, which means it does not necessarily have to be a registered charity.
